The most common residential solar panel measures approximately 65" x 39" x 1.5" (5.4 feet by 3.25 feet) and produces 350-450 watts. This is known as a 60-cell panel configuration.

Over 179 (GW) of solar capacity is installed nationwide and it's capable of powering roughly 33 million homes. While it takes roughly 17 (400-watt) panels to power a home.

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
